

Congress Critter Accountability Act

As of 2019, there have been 483 laws enacted by congress that have been declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court. The amount of time and money spent in litigation must be considered to avoid this in the future. For that reason, I am proposing the CCAA as both remuneration of those costs and a warning to Congress Critters that frivolous, petty and ideological laws they pass will have consequences.

Here's how it works:

If the law is declared unconstitutional, those Congress Critters who voted for the passage of the law shall be made responsible for the payment for the time and legal fees involved with the litigation. The sponsors of the unconstitutional law shall be held responsible at twice the fine. The payments are to be by the Critter, not their political party.

Every year, the Supreme Court receives an average of 8,000 petitions for a hearing. Each year, the court has agreed to hear only about 80. That's 1%.

Most of the cases the Supreme Court hears are appeals from lower courts, currently 94 district courts within 13 circuit courts. The district courts have a total of 673 judges while the circuit courts have 179 judges.

The President appoints circuit court federal district court judges with Senate approval. The rest are usually appointed by state governors.

Let's not forget the state supreme courts. There are 346 total judges in 52 states.

That's a total of 1227 judges **selected by politicians** to determine *truths that are supposed to be self evident*.
