



Why I Question The Lame Stream Media:

National VFW convention last week:

The president, who received cheers as he attacked "fake news", urged the audience to reject completely any stories they see covered in the news media that might be negative towards him. "Don't believe the crap you see from these people, the fake news," Trump said, as the audience mostly comprised of veterans and their families booed and heckled reporters in the press pen. "Just remember, what you're seeing and what you're reading is not what's happening."

Following the president's departure from Kansas City, the VFW issued a statement saying it was "disappointed" that audience members booed the reporters in the convention center. "We were disappointed to hear some of our members boo the press," Randi Law, Manager of Communications and Public Affairs for VFW told ABC News. "The reporters onsite today were our invited guests and we rely on them to help spread the VFW's message."

For someone with her job description to be this blind to political optics is mind boggling. Let me mention just a few of the reasons veterans, in particular Vietnam veterans, loath and despise the press. Every major news outlet during the Vietnam war praised President Johnson's hands on approach and how he was going to win it. In a script devised by Robert McNamara, military



commanders were chosen by their ability to not question the tactics handed down by politicians who had no clue to what war was about. I remember one mission where we had identified a ground to air enemy missile site and had to contact Washington for permission to bomb it. It took six hours to get permission and just four hours for the missile site to be moved exactly the distance where we would have to obtain new permission. This micro management of the Vietnam war was authored and run by McNamara who, years later, wrote a book apologizing for the way he "helped" Johnson run military operations that resulted in a number of our aircraft shot down because the politicians thought it only fair to warn the targets about the planned operations. When their brilliant military tactics failed, the press was manipulated by people like Ms Law who worked for McNamara to shift blame to the military. We were called baby killers, spat upon and physically attacked at airports and even told to not wear our uniforms when flying commercial to get back to Vietnam for second, third and even fourth tours. My Lai was an isolated case but presented over several months by the press as typical. Walter Cronkite, "the most trusted man in America" used a fake picture of a C 130 plane accident as "proof" we were losing the war. He repeated this story for weeks to the point the aircraft was torn apart because parts became souvenirs. Draft card burning became patriotic. South Vietnam's leadership was a joke with the CIA in the middle of it. Ho Chi Minh smoked three packs of Camels a day. All Johnson had to do was arrange to meet with Ho Chi and offer him an unlimited supply of cigarettes and help in replacing the corrupt politicians in the south. Instead of any art of the deal, Johnson was worried about re-election. He finally gave up and the press turned their attention to President Nixon and placed full blame for Vietnam on the military and Republicans. So, Ms Law...that help explain things for you?
